**Paul Kelton**

**"Indigenous Studies at SBU: Challenges and Opportunities"**

**Paul Kelton**, the Robert David Lion Gardiner Chair in American History, has published on Native Americans and their experience with introduced-diseases. He came to Stony Brook in fall 2017 from the University of Kansas, where he was professor of history. He received his PhD in history from the University of Oklahoma.

**"My Recent Trip to the Andes. (Or, the Bolivian V.P. and me.)"**

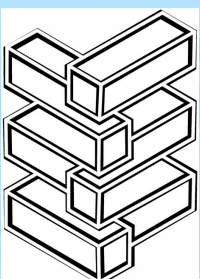
**Brooke Larson** is Professor of History at Stony Brook University. She has worked in the fields of Andean history and indigenous ethnohistory since the 1970s. She is author or co-editor of several books in English and Spanish, and is currently finishing a book that traces the lineages of Aymara peasant struggles for cultural power, rights, and autonomy across 20th century Bolivian history.



**Nancy Tomes**

**"The Reluctant Pundit"**

**Nancy Tomes** is a Distinguished Professor of History at Stony Brook University, where she has taught since 1978. She is the author of four books, most recently *Remaking the American Patient: How Madison Avenue and Modern Medicine Turned Patients into Consumers* which won the 2017 Bancroft Prize.



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
