Plagiarism is using others' ideas and words without clearly acknowledging the source of that information. Students are continually engaged with other people's ideas: they read them in texts, hear them in lectures, discuss them in their classes, and incorporate them into their own writing. As a result, it is very important that each student give credit where it is due. Plagiarism, intentional or unintentional, is considered academic dishonesty and all instances will be reported to the Academic Judiciary. To avoid plagiarism, you must give credit whenever you use another person's idea, opinion, or theory; any facts, statistics, graphs, drawings, or any other pieces of information, that are not common knowledge; quotations of another person's actual spoken or written words; or paraphrase of another person's spoken or written words. Citing all sources and putting direct quotations in quotation marks are required.
