Ethnicity, Pluralism and Nationhood in Singapore

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Singapore is a prosperous nation known for its rich history and multicultural heritage. The economic development has been attributed to the cultural contributions from diverse populations guided by government policies and laws regulating ethnic representation in housing, education, civil service and other forms of socioeconomic participation. The 15-day study tour will explore the melding of populations against the backdrop of British imperialism, post-colonial nation-building, Chinese and Indian diaspora, globalization and trade networks. The class will visit heritage sites, museums, places of worship and historic landmarks of the three major populations of Chinese, Malays, Tamil (Indians). Additional excursions include popular sightseeing attractions. The course includes a three-day trip to the Malaysian city of Melaka known for its history of colonialism and cultural diversity. Through the experience, students will gain an understanding of the factors that transformed Singapore from a trading village to a 21st Century model for nation-building.

This course is offered as both AAS 340 and HIS 340. DEC: J, SBC: SBS+, EXP+. 3 credits

GOAL

To survey the demographic, social and cultural diversity of present day Singapore and the historical impact of government policies and administrative practices on the daily lives of its multi-ethnic population.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES (LO)

- LO1: Understand the historical events that have shaped the peoples and political economy of Singapore.
- LO2: Distinguish between different ethnic populations that contribute to Singapore culture and society.
- LO3: Learn government policies and cultural practices that impact relations between ethnic groups.
- LO4: Identify major differences in language, religion, local commerce and cuisine among the population.

COURSE DELIVERY

This is a hybrid study abroad course. There will be face-to-face lectures while the group is in Singapore. In addition to the two-week study-tour in Singapore and Melaka, Malaysia, there will be online assignments prior to and after the travel period. The course is delivered in the Blackboard (Bb) learning management system (LMS). Students must be mindful of all course expectations, deliverables and due dates. COURSE REQUIREMENTS

A. Pre-Departure Essay I: Based on the film History of Singapore Part I and II. 15% of the course grade. In 400 words (2 pages) or more describe three events in the colonial era that you feel had the most impact on modern Singapore. How do you imagine this history of the wider Southeast Asia region might be influenced if Raffles and the British had not developed Singapore?

Deadline: One week (Saturday) prior to departure.

B. Pre-Departure Essay II: Based on the film City of the Future: Singapore. In 400 words (2 pages) or more, describe the influences of globalization on the government policies in Singapore – 15% of the course grade. Deadline: Friday prior to departure.

C. Group Oral Reports: Students are divided into groups to give 30 minute presentations based on an assigned article or chapter of a book. The time and date TBA. 15% of the course grade.

D. Journal - 45%.of the course grade. Based on the personal reflections and observations on the trip submit a day-to-day journal of your experiences. Describe and provide reactions to the places and people that you

encounter and how they challenge your view of the country and the ideals of multiculturalism. The minimal length is 2000 words (10 pages). Deadline: 2nd Sunday after returning.

E. Attendance- 10% of the course grade. All activities including those on the itinerary are mandatory. Students must remain with the group during the entire travel period except when an exception is requested and approved by the instructor in advance of the tour departure.
